Teaching Artist: Early Childhood/Strings

Early Childhood Teaching Artists (TAs) work to support our Mozart Orchestra Ensemble Director in general music and beginning instrumental instruction to youth ages 4 to 6 years-old. As part of our curriculum, lessons are crafted with an emphasis on nurturing a child's social-emotional development; increasing their self-confidence, social awareness and positive decision-making skills; while unleashing their creativity and curiosity for music-making. TAs are provided with staff meeting time and professional development opportunities with a focus on inclusive teaching practices, social-emotional learning (SEL), culturally- responsive teaching, and learning strategies. TAs will also receive support and guidance from our SEL and Music Technology Specialists, Ensemble Directors, and Program Manager on an on-going basis.

Teaching Artist Responsibilities:

- Support general music & beginning strings classes to kindergarten-age youth with an emphasis on early instrumental pedagogy
- Work in collaboration with our BMP early childhood music team to set weekly goals for music rehearsals. Goals should be based on the standards outlined in the Boston Music Project Curriculum
- With Ensemble Director, complete student progress and individual learning plans as needed and mid-year/year-end student evaluations, with support from the Program Manager
